Keeping your child safe when travelling to and from school

Please review road safety with your children to ensure safe travel to and from school. Remind them about the importance of crossing the road safely and using pedestrian crossings.

Your primary aged child is still developing an understanding of danger and safety. While they are often keen to do things for themselves, an adult must always be responsible for your child in the traffic environment.

Your child is a vulnerable road user. They are still developing the skills that help them to judge the direction of sound and the speed and distance of vehicles. Your child is physically small, making it harder for drivers to see them. They may be easily distracted and tend to only be able to focus on one thing at a time. This means that they find it difficult to deal with sudden changes in the traffic environment.

Students in Early Stage 1 and Stage 1: Hold a grown-up's hand when they cross the road, are on the footpath, or in a car park

Students in Stage 2: Hold an adult's hand when they cross the road. Use a safe place to cross the road.

Students in Stage 3: Stop! Look! Listen! Think! Every time you cross the road. Use a safe place to cross the road

I often stumble upon some little gems and this is one I found particularly relevant in relation to schooling and its role in preparation for life. Part of our school ethos is we aim to build resilient young people and I couldn't help but make the connection between what we are doing here at Wideview and what Julie outlines in this brief article. As a parent I found some real pearls of wisdom here. I hope you do too. Enjoy.

Julie Lythcott-Haims, Author, NYT Bestseller How to Raise an Adult, former Stanford Dean writes:

An 18-year-old must be able to talk to strangers - faculty, deans, advisers, landlords, store clerks, human resource managers, co-workers, bank tellers, health care providers, bus drivers, mechanics - in the real world.

The crutch: We teach kids not to talk to strangers instead of teaching the more nuanced skill of how to discern the few bad strangers from the mostly good ones. Thus, kids end up not knowing how to approach strangers - respectfully and with eye contact - for the help, guidance, and direction they will need out in the world.

An 18-year-old must be able to find his way around - a campus, the town in which her summer job is located, or the city where he is working or studying abroad.

The crutch: We drive or accompany our children everywhere, even when a bus, their bicycle, or their own feet could get them there; thus, kids don't know the route for getting from here to there, how to cope with transportation options, when and how to fill the car with gas, or how to make and execute transportation plans.

An 18-year-old must be able to manage his assignments, workload, and deadlines.

The crutch: We remind kids when their homework is due and when to do it - sometimes helping them do it, sometimes doing it for them; thus, kids don't know how to prioritize tasks, manage workload, or meet dead-lines, without regular reminders.

An 18-year-old must be able to contribute to the running of a household. The crutch: We don't ask them to help much around the house because the check-listed childhood leaves little time in the day for anything aside from academic and extracurricular work; thus, kids don't know how to look after their own needs, respect the needs of others, or do their fair share for the good of the whole.

An 18-year-old must be able to handle interpersonal problems. The crutch: We step in to solve misunder-standings and soothe hurt feelings for them; thus, kids don't know how to cope with and resolve conflicts without our intervention.

An 18-year-old must be able to cope with ups and downs of courses and workloads, college-level work, competition, tough teachers, bosses, and others. The crutch: We step in when things get hard, finish the task, extend the deadline, and talk to the adults; thus, kids don't know that in the normal course of life things won't always go their way, and that they'll be okay regardless.

An 18-year-old must be able to earn and manage money. The crutch: They don't hold part-time jobs; they receive money from us for whatever they want or need; thus, kids don't develop a sense of responsibility for completing job tasks, accountability to a boss who doesn't inherently love them, or an appreciation for the cost of things and how to manage money.

An 18-year-old must be able to take risks. The crutch: We've laid out their entire path for them and have avoided all pitfalls or prevented all stumbles for them; thus, kids don't develop the wise understanding that success comes only after trying and failing and trying again (aka "grit") or the thick skin (aka "resilience") that comes from coping when things have gone wrong.

Remember: Our kids must be able to do all of these things without resorting to calling a parent on the phone. If they're calling us to ask how, they do not have the life skill.

1. Do I need a ticket?

Yes, either a printed one or one displayed on your phone. All seats will be labelled and ushers will assist you.

2. Will the students see other classes perform?

Yes, at the Dress rehearsal on Monday 9th December. Parents cannot watch this rehearsal.

3. What does my child wear to school on Monday 9th December?

For the dress rehearsal all students are to come to school in their uniform and bring all of their costume items. Children will get changed at school ready for the rehearsal.

All students are required to change back into their school uniform following the dress rehearsal. Please label all costume and school uniform items and place in a labelled bag.

4. What does my child wear to school on Wednesday 11th December?

School uniform. Students will have an early recess then get changed.

All students are required to change back into their school uniform following the matinee performance.

5. What does my child wear to school on Wednesday 11th December for the twilight and Thursday 12th for the evening concert?

Costumes and make up, if required. A quick dinner prior to the concerts will give them stamina for the night and we request that the students do not bring food/lollies. Children are to bring a water bottle.

6. How long will the concert be?

1 1/2—2 hours with no intervals. All students will be part of a finale so once they have performed their class item they need to remain with their teachers in the classroom until collected.

7. Where will the students be when they are not performing?

In their classrooms. Students need to be signed out from their classrooms by their parents following the show.

8. What costume will the students be wearing?

Your class teacher has already been in contact with you. Some classes will have limited costumes and others will require more work. If parent involvement is required, your help would be of great assistance.

9. Times to be at school?

5:00pm for the twilight performance and 6:30pm for the evening performance

10. When will the doors be open?

15 minutes prior to the show starting.
