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Messages from the Principal

Mothers Day

Uniforms are looking Great

We are now transitioning to full winter uniform, I would like to thank all parents for ensuring your children wear their complete uniform each day (including polished black shoes). We are fortunate at Wideview to have a team of wonderful volunteers who assist in the Uniform Shop. If you wish to purchase uniform items please don't hesitate to contact Mrs Porter. Under the COVID Guidelines you presently are not required to make an appointment before arriving.

Here is the current COVID rules from DOE

It is important that schools continue to follow the COVID-19 guidelines. In particular we wish to highlight the following:

- Students should not attend school if unwell, even with mild symptoms of COVID-19. Any person with any COVID-19 symptoms should be sent home and should not return until they have received a negative test result forwarded to the school and are symptom-free. In circumstances where children have other medical reasons for recurrent symptoms a letter from their GP is sufficient to negate the requirement for a negative test.
- All visitors to a school site must be well and symptom free, comply with sign-in arrangements, and the 1.5m physical distancing requirements.
- Visitors to schools and offices should maintain 1.5m distance from other people where practicable. Avoid congestion of groups of visitors in specific areas where possible.
- All visitors to a school site must use the sign-in sheet or the iPad in the office foyer where they acknowledge that they will comply with the COVID-19 requirements for visitors. Visitors must also check in using the Service NSW QR code.

Helping my Child to Read

Reading is the main requirement for nearly all activities we do in life whether it be filling a form or selecting what to eat in a Café. We often get enquiries from parents regarding what to do at home to assist children acquire reading skills. One of the pitfalls when listening to children read is to jump in and tell them tricky words or to make corrections in missed or substituted words.

What we really need to do is to allow some wait time to let the child mull over the word or self-correction. Teachers tend to use the *Pause, Prompt, Praise* technique.

Pause

When your child comes to a word they don't know, it's very tempting to tell them the word straight away but we really want them to try to work out the word using the strategies they are being encouraged to use at school. This is where the pause is so important as they can try to self-correct or work out the word for themselves.

Prompt

After the pause (about 3 seconds) we prompt them to try some quick strategies:

- Try reading on for a sentence or two, miss out the difficult word and see if that helps you to work it out what it is.
- Look at the sound the word begins with, use that clue and think about what might make sense here.
- Look at the pictures and see if they give you a clue to what the word might be.
- Break up the word into chunks, e.g. playground can be broken into play and ground then combine the word to the original form.
- Go back to the beginning of the sentence, re-read it and have another go at working it out.

If prompts are not working tell the child the correct word because the more time spent on a word means they will forget what they had been reading about.

Praise

Praise your child's reading efforts and successes by telling them what they did well.

Reading should be a successful and enjoyable experience for the children and for you as parents. If children find reading too difficult they will not enjoy the process and more than likely want to give up.

After reading the story, you could spend some time talking about the book.

- What you liked.
- What you thought about the character.
- Make links to the text, through personal experiences or what they know such as is the character like someone you know?

If your child is just beginning to learn to read and they are starting to read the book from memory (not looking at the words), play some searching games like: *find the picture that shows what I'm saying*.

It is important for the child to have a success rate of at least 95% to be able to read a book for enjoyment. If they aren't able to complete at 95% the book is too hard for them.

You can use the "five finger" test to work this out. Ask your child to read about 100 words and every time they make an error without self-correcting the error put down a finger. If you put down five fingers within

those 100 words then the book is too hard.

If your child really wants to read a book that is too difficult you can read it to them, or read parts to them.

As children learn to read and learn to deepen their understanding of the texts they read, they are taught to use a range of strategies.

School Volunteers

We appreciate having parents helping us at school in many different capacities. Please ensure you sign in at the office and complete the WWCC declaration form. The declaration form is only required to be completed for the school once, until either your child leaves the school or the DoE replaces the form.

Student Reports

Twice per year parents/caregivers receive written reports about how their children are progressing at school. Student reports outline summative information about performance and application in academic and social aspects of schooling. Teachers are currently assessing how students in their respective classes are progressing, in readiness for reports being issued at the end of term. I acknowledge and thank all teachers for the way they are assessing students and translating their knowledge of how each student has achieved into Semester One reports. The Department of Education has clearly defined elements which schools must include in student reports including a five-point scale which students will be measured against.

Level of Achievement - Years 1-6 only. Kindergarten students will be reported against a simpler three-point scale.

Outstanding: The student has an extensive knowledge and understanding of the content and can readily apply this knowledge. In addition, the student has achieved a very high level of competence in the processes and skills and can apply these skills to new situations.

High: The student has a thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and a high level of competence in the processes and skills. In addition, the student is able to apply this knowledge and these skills to most situations.

Sound: The student has a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.

Basic: The student has a basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a limited level of competence in the processes and skills.

Limited: The student has an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills.

You will note the "sound" section is all in bold. Sound is the achievement level that you, as parents, should use as a guide to ascertain how your children are progressing. If they achieve 'sound', they are on-track according to outcomes designed for their stage of learning. If children are assessed above or below 'sound', their depth of understanding is either higher than what the syllabus expects students to know OR they are still learning skills and concepts associated with stage expectations.

Level of Effort

Apart from achievement levels, our reports also include effort ratings to allow you to see how hard your child has worked throughout the semester.

STEM Garden – Increasing our 'Dreaming' footprint

Connecting students to country is an important part of living sustainably. It is important to show our students the various land care practices that our indigenous elders have used for thousands of years through 'Caring for Country'.

One aspect of the grant that we would like to increase is our 'Dreaming' footprint by planting more indigenous and native plants species around the school.

Our Year 6 students have begun this project at the rear of the school. Each session begins with an 'Acknowledgment of Country'. This is an important part of our work. It where we acknowledge that we are on Darug land and pay our respect to the traditional custodians of the land.

Our students have begun to catalogue the various indigenous, native, introduced and invasive species. They plan to remove those invasive species shortly and replace them with indigenous and native plants.

As Costa from Gardening Australia says – Autumn is a great time to plant indigenous and native species as they have time to establish themselves before summer begins.

COVID Symptoms and absences

In accordance with advice from NSW Health, parents and carers are reminded NOT to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms. Schools will make arrangements for any students showing any symptoms to be collected. NSW Health have requested that schools encourage anyone who has even mild flu-like symptoms, to arrange to be tested through their local medical practitioner or one of the COVID-19 clinics.

Symptoms include:

- Fever
- Cough
- Sore or scratchy throat
- Shortness of breath
- Loss of smell/taste

Students with flu-like symptoms will need to provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result before being permitted to return to school. We ask that you please forward results to the office at wideviewp.school@det.nsw.edu.au please DO NOT send to the class teacher. When completing an absence note we kindly ask that you please be specific in terms of reasons , if only 'unwell' or 'sick' is noted the school will need to contact you for further information.

Parents are also reminded that students should not return until symptom free, regardless of whether they require a COVID test or not.
